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WHY TAKE ACTION ON EQUAL PAY DAY?

We need to pressure governments and businesses to step up and close the gender pay gap once and for all.

Hosting events, even the smallest ones, means building connections - between people and between issues. Closing the gender pay gap involves many intersecting issues such as raising minimum wage, affordable and accessible childcare, access to collective bargaining, employment equity and more. It's a unique issue that can bring together diverse communities to push together for the greater good.

The gender pay gap is a deep-rooted cultural problem. Equal Pay Days ensure we continue the momentum of closing the gap. We're talking about transformational change, not just winning an isolated campaign. That's why our job did not end with the Pay Equity Act was introduced in 1986.

RUN AN EQUAL PAY DAY EVENT

Who do I reach out to for events and online?

1. Start with people you know:

Phone or email your friends, family, neighbours and coworkers to invite them to come to your event or sign the closing the pay gap declaration online (<u>bit.ly/1fdeQqX</u>).

2. Branch out:

Consider reaching out to organizations in your community who are working on a variety of issues related to closing the gender pay gap, such as unions, women's centres, child care groups, anti-violence against women groups, LGBTQ centres, business associations etc.

How to create a Facebook event

Create Your Event:

Click **Events** in the left menu of your homepage.

Click **Create Event** in the top right.

Fill in the information for your event.

Name: Equal Pay Day [insert town name]

Details: Feel free to write your own event description or cut & paste this: Although pay equity is the law in Ontario, women, on average, earn 31% less than men. This pay gap affects women of all ages and education levels.

Women are often paid less, even when their skill, effort, responsibility and working conditions are similar to men's. Women of colour, Aboriginal women and women with disabilities face the worst discrimination.

If you believe in building an Ontario where men and women are equal, then we need your help for a major push to close the gap for good.

Equal Pay Day is April 16th, 2014

Equal Pay Day illustrates how far into the next year a woman must work to earn the same amount a man made in the previous year.

Join us at our [rally, panel, presentation, flash dance, etc]!

Where: Fill in your event's location

When: Fill in the time of your event.

Privacy Setting:

Choose from the following options:

- Public anyone can find the event
- Friends of Guests only friends of people attending can find the event
- Invite Only only those that you or your guests invite can find the event

Tick: Guests can invite friends.

Invite Friends: Click Invite Friends in the bottom left of the dialogue box and select the friends you want to invite.

Click Create. Your event is created!

Plan a flash mob

A flash mob is a group of people who assemble suddenly in a public place, put on a performance (e.g. a dance, a skit etc), then quickly disperse, often for the purposes of public awareness on an issue. Here's an example of a flash mob from the US on Equal Pay Day: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=YpzIaAOSJRQ</u>

Flash mobs can be a really fun, playful way to get a message out. But, it can take a bit of planning. Here are some tips:

- 1. Have a clear-cut goal (what specific message do you want to send?)
- 2. Create a compelling act that supports your goal. Use humour and have some entertainment value.
 - the linked American flash mob used themed songs that worked very well with the message (e.g. Hard Knock Life, Working 9 to 5, etc.)
- 3. Plan a date and location with a built-in crowd
 - think public squares, city hall etc.
- 4. Visit your site and attend to logistics
 - you need to bring a PA then you need to make sure you have a power source!
- 5. Invite people
 - Start with your own networks and contact the coalition to see who's in your area! Reach out to organizations that might be interested.
- 6. Practice if necessary
 - If it's not reasonable to get everyone together to practice, at least visit the site with some of the key organizers to figure out how you will lead the flash mob
- 7. Have fun!!
